

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Country Fair

Everyone was thankful that the rain held off until after the 37th Annual Amos Herr Park Country Fair on Sunday, September 15, 2016. This was the first time that the tobacco barn on the Herr Homestead was open to the public. John Houston, president of the foundation, spent four hours cleaning the barn in preparation of the visitors. Faye Forwood, Emeritus board member, devoted the day to sharing information about tobacco growing and harvesting. Faye's grandfather was a well-known tobacco farmer who lived in Manor Township and she had a very interesting display of items related to tobacco farming. Everyone who toured the tobacco barn was impressed and came away knowing much more about the process of raising tobacco. Ninety visitors took a self-guided tour of the Herr Homestead during the Country Fair. We hope that sometime in the near future, those people will return for a more in depth tour of the house.

A Brief History of Landisville – Part II

Roads and Travel

In 1798, the Minnich family owned the eastern end of what was to later be called Landisville, while the Heistand family owned all the land west. The road that went through the Heistand and Minnich lands, now called the Harrisburg Pike, was named the King's highway in 1792. Later, the King's highway became known as the Lancaster and Mount Joy turnpike. It was a toll road with toll booths located along the length of the highway. One of the tollbooths stood at the corner of Nissley Road and Harrisburg Pike. The tollbooth marker is pictured below. (We have a photo of this tollbooth and one of the tokens in our library.) The "highway" became a free road in 1918.

In 1834, the Pennsylvania Railroad came through town. Trolley service eventually ran from Elizabethtown and Mount Joy, through Landisville to Lancaster. If you have ever wondered why Bank Street in Landisville is so wide, it is because that is where the trolley tracks went through town.





Notes From Emma's Diary

Thursday, November 8, 1917

"I must get busy & work -go over house & dust - downstairs & up -- & mend a bit & pick up sticks."

Bits and Pieces

In 1921, the Landisville Speedway was the place to be on Sunday afternoons. Located on the Nissley farm on Nissley Road, right down from what is now A. Herr Park, the auto races attracted spectators from up and down the east coast. The cow barn became the changing room for the drivers and the hayloft was the sleeping quarters for many of the out-of-state drivers. Our library has much more information if you are interested.

The Bamford Lead Mines operated from 1860 to the mid 1870's (from cover). The mines were located at the end of Bamford Road. The smelter was on Yellow Goose Road where Kellogg's is now. A complete history of the mines (including photographs) is in the Herr House library.

The Landisville Camp Meeting was organized in 1870 by the Methodist Church on 20 acres of land on the east side of Church Street. It was not unusual for 10,000 people to attend. The camp meeting still exists as an independent organization.

The 1890's saw the era of town bands in Landisville. It was not unusual for towns to have several bands. (The Coronet band is pictured left). Landisville also had a public croquet court where teams competed against each other.

The house with the double porch at Yellow Goose Road and Harrisburg Pike was built as an inn in 1810.

Notes From Amos' Diary

Thursday October 21, 1971

"80 degrees – 5:30 clear & warm. Chores. Feed the horses for Ed. To village. P.O., Benders for coffee with Jack B. etc. Usual gossip, mostly banter. Learn that Bob Brubaker is in the hospital with some heart damage. It's still a beautiful, sunny, warm morning. Ethel went to the Church to sew. I went to Lanc. For slides and shopping, Lunch at Roy Rogers. Mow lawn. How tall grass keeps growing. Stubble corn, afternoon coke. Work in the cornfield after supper. Certainly does not feel or look like autumn. Deskwork. Music TV theater "Lemonade." Bill Snavely visited with us for about an hour. He was interested in getting more information about the Perfect Committee job."
