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Salunga Post Office

The Salunga Post Office was part of Hiestand's Store on Main Street in Salunga. The first postmaster was Simon Hiestand, owner of Hiestand's Store. He served as postmaster for 50 years from 1893 until his retirement on June 30, 1943. Mary K. Minnich was his successor until the post office closed on April 30, 1960.

The mail was delivered by a steam engine run train, which had a mail car, and the mail was sorted on the train. Located behind Hiestand's Mill (directly across the street from the store) was

a steel pole, which had a spring-loaded hook. The mail was taken from the post office every day and was hung on the hook. When the train delivered the mail, the bag was thrown off. The train ran on time and someone would go and pick up the mail every day.

The Eastern Mennonite Missions located at 53 West Brandt Boulevard, Salunga, operated the post office. Upon closing in the late 1980's, they dismantled it and donated it to the Amos Herr House Foundation and Historical Society on May 18, 2000 where it was stored in the corn crib until this year.

The Board members checked the dimensions of the post office and basement and a decision was

made to move the Salunga Post Office into Emma's Keeping Room located in the basement of the 1852 Amos Herr House. It took many man hours and lots of hard work, however when looking at it, it does resemble the original post office. John Houston, President of the Amos Herr House Foundation and Historical Society dedicated many hours moving and reassembling the post office to its new location.

Notes From Emma's Diary

Saturday, May 3, 1941

"Kemp & Philesph wedding a beautiful day, very dusty - I clean up downstairs & dust & clean up kitchen - take a nap. Amos & Ben are planting corn & plant 12 acres. Me just don't go to wedding me bad I guess but Amos is (busy) ha - I retire early don't get to Lanc either."

Forever Friends remember Rohrerstown (cont'd from Spring newsletter)

As remembered by two "Forever Friends," Eileen Bender and Shirley Sigman

Our Post Office was a wandering one, a 10 x 16 shack that was once a Barber Shop and then moved in 1930 to Wood Street where it became our official Rohrerstown Post Office. Our identity was lost when our 17552 zip code was changed to 17603 Lancaster. As of April 7, 1962 the Post Office shack was no longer needed and a new brick Post Office building was dedicated. One would have a difficult time finding the Rohrerstown Post Office today as it is hidden in a shopping center nearby.

Before our time we discovered that there had been a Harmony Literary Society. H. M. Mayer, John H. Shenck, Sara Mauk, and Miss Devore organized it in 1884. There was also a Rohrerstown Brass Band from 1894-1899 We do remember the Rohrerstown band, still in existence, because the music makers practiced in the 2nd floor of Walter Fenstermacher's barn every Monday evening in the summertime.

A parade to dedicate the new firehouse in 1961 was almost as enjoyable as preparing for the bi-centennial in 1976. The forgotten post office, now known as Jake's house was transformed into a very colonial one-room museum. Every house in town loaned their best antiques to us to help to add to our upcoming decorating abilities. Does anyone remember the Wood St. HOBY (Help others before yourself) Club?

In the day, this exercise used to be done at the post office or Walk's Hotel (located where Turkey Hill built one of their first stores in Lancaster Co.) Russ Markley owned an earlier filling station.

As we composed this collection of memories, it was the laughter and the tears that reminded us of the how important it is to have a FOREVER FRIEND.
