New President for Amos Herr House Foundation

John made many contributions to the organization during his 17 years as president including playing an instrumental role in restoring the barn and tobacco shed, and setting up various barn displays alongside Gary Bender. John ensured that many necessary repairs and upkeep to the Amos Herr House were completed.

Also at the November board meeting, Millie Brubaker was reinstated as secretary after a very brief retirement.

Homestead Spring 2023 Opening

The Amos Herr House Foundation is pleased to announce the reopening of the house for tours on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of each month from May through October. Tours will begin at 1pm with the last tour beginning at 3:15pm.

Some interesting things to see in the home include the Sun Quest Sundial, made by Richard Schmoyer. Ken Clark set this display up in the basement. Also of special note is the actual Salunga Post Office, also set up in the basement. Additionally, there are historical artifacts too numerous to mention. We invite our members to encourage their friends and relatives to enjoy some local history this spring, summer and fall.

The barn will also be open on the same schedule. Many agricultural implements from the late 1800's to the 1900's are on display in the barn, including a Herr family spring wagon and tractors. The tobacco barn features a stripping room along with a tobacco wagon and other items pertaining to raising tobacco.

SWISS BEAR CLOCK



This unusual carved bear clock was carved and built by Mr. Peiler, a Swiss craftsman from the Bernese-Oberland area. He only made two of these clocks before he died in 1918 at the age of 82 years.

The clock is carved in solid walnut and strikes at fifteen minute intervals. In addition to the five carved bears, there wildflowers are four called "WaldenMeisters" (Forest-masters) carved on the rocks at the base of the clock. In season, the Swiss would gather these flowers and float them in punch bowls of white wine for several days. The wine absorbs the aroma of the flowers, giving it a distinctive flavor which is highly cherished by the Swiss.

The clock was purchased by Harry Hoyt Nissley, originally from the Landisville area and later of Detroit, Michigan. The Nissley ancestors emigrated from the Palatine of Germany

and earlier from Switzerland, coming to Pennsylvania in 1717. The original Nissley farm was on both sides of what is now Nissley Road, south of the Old Harrisburg Pike. Mr. Nissley researched and wrote a complete history of the Nissley family going back to the earliest recorded Swiss ancestors. This is available at the AHHF library if anyone is interested.

Until May of 1998, the clock was in the lobby of the Mellon Bank on Main Street, Landisville. Hoyt Nissley made the stipulation prior to his death that the clock should never leave the Landisville area. The clock belongs to the Lancaster County Historical Society and is on loan to the Amos Herr House Foundation for display at the 1852 Herr Homestead in Landisville. In 1998, the clock was valued at \$8,500.00. This is part of the collection.
